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Abstract. Ecotourism, as a sustainable alternative to conventional tourism, has become a pivotal component in global travel and environmental conservation. By comparing international standards with regional practices in Uzbekistan, the paper highlights how ecotourism fosters economic development while preserving cultural heritage and biodiversity. Key aspects such as responsible travel, environmental education, community involvement, and low-impact practices are emphasized. Moreover, the study examines ecotourism's role in rural development, protected area management, and the promotion of local traditions. The analysis identifies the growing demand for eco-friendly travel options and the need for integrated policy frameworks to support sustainable tourism models. This paper contributes to a deeper understanding of ecotourism's evolution and its socio-economic and ecological significance in both global and Central Asian contexts.

Аннотация

As concerns over climate change, biodiversity loss, and cultural homogenization have intensified, both tourists and tour operators are increasingly turning toward more sustainable and responsible forms of travel. Ecotourism, by definition, refers to responsible travel to natural areas that conserves the environment, sustains the well-being of the local people, and involves interpretation and education. It goes beyond traditional tourism by promoting conservation, minimizing environmental impact, and providing socio-economic benefits to local communities. The roots of ecotourism can be traced back to the environmental movements of the 1970s, but its development accelerated significantly in the 1990s as awareness of ecological and cultural fragility grew. In many ways, ecotourism represents a synthesis of nature-based tourism, environmental education, and sustainable development principles. As the demand for meaningful and nature-centered experiences rises, ecotourism has diversified into a range of forms including wildlife tourism, adventure ecotourism, community-based tourism, and agro-ecotourism, among others. Modern ecotourism is not a uniform phenomenon; its forms and priorities vary significantly across regions, cultures, and economic contexts. In countries like the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom, ecotourism often emphasizes conservation, scientific research, and high-quality interpretive experiences. Meanwhile, in developing countries, including Uzbekistan, ecotourism is increasingly viewed as a tool for rural development, poverty reduction, and cultural preservation. The unique natural and cultural landscapes of Uzbekistan—such as the Nuratau Mountains, the Aral Sea region, and the eco-villages in Navoi and Samarkand provinces—offer significant potential for ecotourism development. These areas are now being explored and promoted as alternative travel destinations that combine heritage, sustainability, and community engagement. In both global and Uzbek contexts, ecotourism is aligned with international frameworks such as the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly goals related to environmental sustainability, inclusive

economic growth, and the protection of cultural and natural heritage. Furthermore, as digital media, eco-certification systems, and traveler awareness evolve, ecotourism is becoming more regulated and refined in its practices and outcomes. This paper aims to explore the basic concepts, directions, and forms of modern ecotourism by analyzing English and Uzbek sources. The study will examine how ecotourism is defined and interpreted in different contexts, highlight emerging trends and directions, and categorize the main forms based on ecological, cultural, and economic criteria. By drawing comparisons between international models and local practices in Uzbekistan, this research seeks to contribute to a more comprehensive understanding of ecotourism as both a theoretical construct and a practical solution for sustainable tourism development.

Literature review: The term ecotourism was popularized in the 1980s and is often defined as responsible travel to natural areas that conserves the environment, sustains the well-being of local people, and involves interpretation and education (The International Ecotourism Society, 2015). According to Weaver (2001), ecotourism is distinguished from mass tourism by its low-impact and educational nature. Fennell (2008) further emphasizes that ecotourism includes ethical responsibility, environmental sustainability, and benefits to host communities. In Uzbekistan, the concept has been embraced as part of the country's strategy to diversify its tourism economy while promoting conservation, particularly in areas like the Nuratau Mountains and the Aral Sea region. Modern ecotourism has taken several strategic directions, adapting to local ecological, cultural, and socio-economic contexts: Community-Based Ecotourism (CBET): This approach actively involves local communities in tourism planning and management. It ensures that a fair share of economic benefits returns to the host community while promoting local stewardship of natural resources (Scheyvens, 1999). Protected Area Ecotourism: According to Eagles et al. (2002), protected areas like national parks and nature reserves are key ecotourism sites. Tourism revenues help fund conservation and provide employment opportunities. Adventure and Wildlife Ecotourism: Activities such as bird watching, trekking, and wildlife safaris are designed to provide meaningful nature experiences. These also raise awareness about endangered species and habitats (Honey, 2008). In Uzbekistan, efforts to develop such directions are supported by international organizations and the government, which has prioritized the development of ecotourism in national strategies. Ecotourism can be categorized into several forms, reflecting its adaptability: Nature-Based Tourism: This involves direct interaction with the natural environment, such as hiking, camping, and wildlife observation. It often overlaps with adventure tourism and is popular in mountainous or desert regions. Agro-Ecotourism: A combination of agricultural practices and tourism. Tourists are hosted on farms and introduced to local food production methods, sustainable agriculture, and rural culture (Lane & Kastenholz, 2015). Cultural Ecotourism: Focuses on preserving and sharing local traditions, customs, and heritage. In

Uzbekistan, tourists can engage with handicrafts, traditional music, and nomadic lifestyles. Educational and Scientific Ecotourism: Geared toward learning, it includes research-focused trips and environmental education programs that engage visitors in conservation issues. Uzbekistan's unique landscapes—ranging from deserts to highlands—offer significant potential for ecotourism. Projects such as those in the Nuratau-Kyzylkum Biosphere Reserve illustrate how ecotourism can benefit both biodiversity conservation and community welfare. According to a 2021 UNDP report, community involvement in homestays and guided nature tours has provided sustainable livelihoods for many rural families. However, challenges remain: Lack of Infrastructure: Many ecotourism sites lack proper transport, sanitation, and accommodation facilities. Environmental Degradation: Overuse of certain natural areas could threaten the very ecosystems ecotourism seeks to protect. Capacity and Education: Local communities may need training in hospitality, foreign languages, and environmental management to fully participate in ecotourism activities. To address these, Uzbekistan has included ecotourism in its "Tourism Development Strategy 2019–2025," aiming to improve accessibility, environmental regulations, and international collaboration. Globally and locally, the future of ecotourism depends on integrated approaches that involve: Policy support and governance for sustainability, Stakeholder cooperation between governments, communities, and the private sector, continued research and education to adapt to environmental and market changes. Ecotourism represents a dynamic and adaptable form of sustainable tourism that benefits both nature and people. From its global definitions to its local applications in Uzbekistan, ecotourism continues to evolve in response to ecological, cultural, and economic challenges. The key to its success lies in proper planning, community involvement, and long-term sustainability strategies.

Ecotourism in Uzbekistan

Uzbekistan, a country rich in history and natural beauty, offers a diverse array of ecotourism experiences that blend cultural heritage with environmental conservation.

1. Diverse Natural Landscapes

Uzbekistan's varied topography includes vast deserts, towering mountain ranges, and serene lakes, each providing unique opportunities for ecotourism. Kyzylkum Desert: This expansive desert offers camel treks and stargazing experiences, allowing visitors to immerse themselves in the tranquil desert environment.

Zaamin National Park: Located in the Jizzakh Region, this park is known for its lush greenery and alpine meadows. It houses over 700 plant species and 40 mammal species, including the snow leopard and Asiatic black bear .Aydarkul Lake: Situated in the heart of the Kyzylkum Desert, this lake is a haven for birdwatchers, hosting species like the Dalmatian pelican and greater flamingo .

2. Community-Based Ecotourism

Communities play a pivotal role in Uzbekistan's ecotourism initiatives: **Sentob Village:** In the Navoi region, Sentob has transformed into an ecotourism hub. Local families operate homestays, offering visitors insights into rural life, traditional crafts, and organic farming. **Tersak Village:** Located in the Samarkand Region, Tersak offers eco-friendly hiking trails and opportunities to engage in traditional agricultural activities, promoting sustainable tourism practices.

3. Conservation Efforts

Uzbekistan is committed to preserving its natural heritage: **Hisar State Reserve:** Spanning over 80,000 hectares, this reserve is home to over 870 plant species and 140 animal species, including the Turkestan lynx and brown bear.

Chatkal Biosphere Reserve: A UNESCO-recognized area, it encompasses diverse ecosystems and supports a rich variety of flora and fauna, including the elusive snow leopard.
