4. Explore the role of linguistic diversity in promoting intercultural communication and cultural preservation.

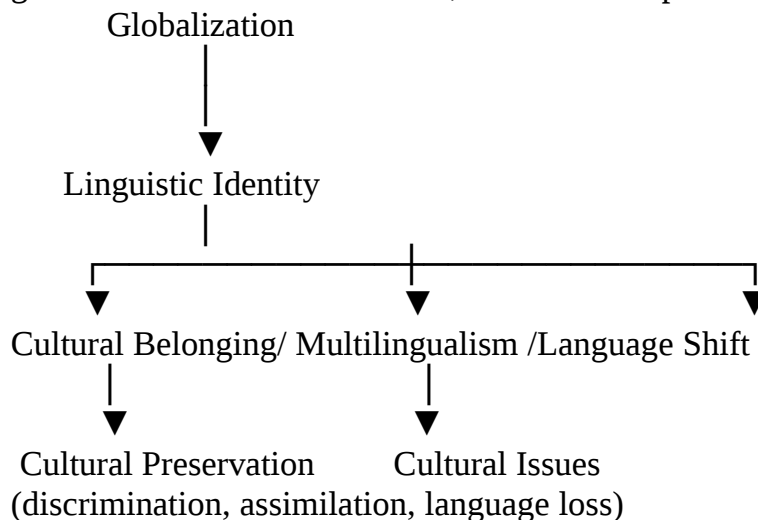
The research addresses the following questions:

These experiences often led to identity conflict, as individuals struggled to reconcile their linguistic heritage with societal expectations of assimilation.

- **Positive outcomes of multilingualism:** Roughly 80 % of respondents who actively maintained multiple linguistic identities reported enhanced intercultural competence, adaptability, and cultural awareness. Multilingualism was perceived not only as a practical skill but also as a source of personal enrichment and social empowerment.

The combined literature and empirical analysis underscore the dual role of linguistic identity in contemporary societies. On one hand, linguistic identity strengthens cultural belonging, serving as a vital link to heritage and community. On the other hand, it exposes individuals to challenges in globalized contexts, where dominant languages often marginalize minority tongues.

Promoting positive attitudes toward linguistic diversity within educational and professional environments can reduce discrimination and foster intercultural dialogue.
